"Taube Center treats the Polish cityscape as a layered text, a palimpsest, to use an old expression, with hidden layers of history and a complex, multicultural past invisible on the surface. We imagine looking down on Warsaw today and seeing two grids, pre-war and postwar, layered one over another. Warsaw becomes a city whose functional, "uninspired" surface hides layers of the Jewish past and of the shared Polish-Jewish past. The remarkable underground levels of Kraków's Old Town offer a metaphor for defining elements of Poland's past including its rich Jewish heritage which are being reaffirmed today. Our narrative moves downward and upward fluidly through layers that reflect the drastic political changes of the past century." (Field Guide to Jewish Krakow and Warsaw, p.3)
